Thanks to the efforts of Father Michael J. McGivney, Assistant Pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, CT the Knights of Columbus was formed in 1882. Founded on the principles of charity, unity and fraternity, Father McGivney's goal was simple - to establish an Order that would unite men in their faith as well as help provide for Catholic families in times of need.

The history of the Order shows how the foresight of Father Michael J. McGivney, whose cause for sainthood is being investigated by the Vatican, brought about what has become the world's foremost Catholic fraternal benefit of society.

The Knights of Columbus has grown from several members in one council to more than 16,000 councils and 1.9 million members throughout the United States, Canada, Philippines, Mexico, Poland, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Bahamas, Virgin Islands, Cuba, Guatemala, and Saipan.

How to Become a Member



Since 1882, membership in the Knights of Columbus has been open to men 18 years of age or older who are "practical" (that is, practicing) Catholics in union with the Holy See. Since that time, the Knights of Columbus has understood "practical catholic" to mean a Catholic who accepts the teaching authority of the Catholic Church on matters of faith and morals, aspires to live in accord with the precepts of the Catholic Church, and is in good standing in the Catholic Church.

Advocate Program



The Advocate Program is designed to help new members (Columbians) to feel welcomed into the Council. We are committed to help new members and to guide them through the adjustments of being an active member of the Waconia Council.

The Program asks current active members, who are known as “Advocates”, to adopt new members and to keep in close touch with new members, providing valuable Knights information. This person could be the person who recruited the new member.

The Advocates Mission:

- Make monthly contacts announcing our business meeting date and to give updates on our current month’s activities.
- An Advocate will get to know his Columbians; his spouse and children, his degree, his parish affiliation, his special interests, and goals. He will use the Advocate Survey for this purpose.
- He will become a Mentor, a True Friend.

How the Knights of Columbus is Structured



Every member belongs to a unit called a “Council”. We are Waconia Council #2506 with membership from St Joseph Catholic Community in Waconia, St Bernard's Catholic Church in Cologne, and St. Victoria Catholic Church in Victoria.

Each Council has elected Officers. Elections are held each fraternal year in June. The Grand Knight (GK) is elected as the leader, and he has a team of elected officers, Directors and members to help organize and facilitate the work of the Council. All members are asked to attend the monthly business (Membership) meetings held on the Third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm. Our Council meetings are held at the Parish Center in the lower level of St. Joseph Church except for the summer months (May – Sept) where we hold the Council meetings at Klein Drive Park (KC Park). The Officers meeting is held prior to the Council meeting at 6:00 pm each month. The outcome of this meeting sets the agenda for the monthly Council meeting.

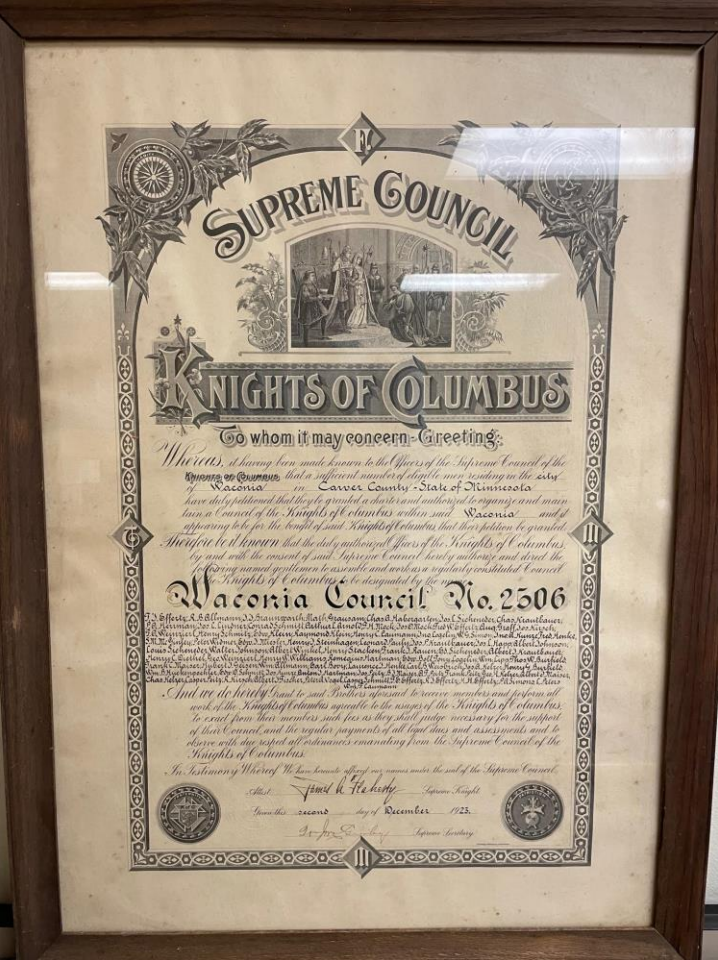
All Councils are organized into units called Districts, which is headed by the District Deputy. Districts combine with other Districts to make up the State Council, which is led by and elected Board of Officers, led by the State Deputy. All the State Councils are comprised of what makes up the Supreme Council.

Cost of Membership



Our Council members pay annual dues of \$30.00 in January of each year. A portion of these funds is what keeps our organization functioning. Each member pays his dues to the Council Financial Secretary. The Council pays dues to the State Council and the Supreme Council. These payments are based on the total number of Council Members. It is very important that you keep your dues current by paying in a timely manner.

A new member will pay either the full amount, if he joins in January, or the Pro-Rated amount based on the month he joins.

Council and Community Activity



Our Council has several fund raisers throughout the year. These fund raisers included Sunday morning breakfasts and fish dinners, held the first six Friday's during lent. Church and Youth Activities



- Award a scholarship to a graduating high school senior whose father is a member of our council. This scholarship is known as "The Father Kauer Scholarship".
- Support the Knights of Columbus Statewide Student Loan Program.
- Annual donation for tuition to a family sending their student to St Joseph Parish School.
- Annually we take part in the statewide activity known as "The Tootsie Roll Program". Funds stay in Carver County and are donated to handicapped youth programs.
- Financially support Seminarians and our council sponsors a Seminarian.
- Join together and pray a rosary for a deceased Knights of Columbus member.
- Our 4th degree members from our council join with other 4th degree members from councils in our area to serve as honor guards for events such as installation of new priests, wakes and funerals of Sir Knights Memorial and other events as requested.
- All 4th degree members from the local council belong to a 4th Degree Assembly that operates out of Shakopee, MN. The 4th Degree operates under the "Fathers Gaiter Assembly 542".
- Support mission trips.
- We provide financial and leadership support for the local Boy and Girl Scout Troops.

Our Founding Principles



The Knights are guided by the founding principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism.

CHARITY – Our Catholic faith teaches us to “Love thy neighbor as thyself”. Members of the Knights of Columbus show love for their neighbors by recognizing that our mission, and our faith in God, compels us to action. There is no better way to experience love and compassion than by helping those in need.

UNITY – None of us as an individual is as good as all of us as a whole. Our members all know that together we can accomplish far more than any of us could individually. This means that, as a Knight of Columbus, you can count on the support and encouragement of your brother Knights as you work to make life better in our parish and community.

FRATERNITY – The Venerable Michael J. McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus, in large part, to provide assistance to the widows and children left behind when the family breadwinner died. Individual Knights give more than 10 million hours of their time to assist sick and disabled members and their families. In the Knights of Columbus, we watch out for and take care of one another.

PATRIOTISM – Members of the Knights of Columbus are patriotic citizens. We are proud of our devotion to God and Country and believe in standing up for both. Whether it’s public or private, the Knights remind the world that Catholics support their nations and are amongst its greatest citizens.

Degrees and Exemplification



There are a total of four different Degrees in the Knights of Columbus. Each of these Degrees focuses on one of our four founding principles.

- The First (Admission) Degree focuses on Charity.
- The Second (Formation) Degree focuses on Unity.
- The Third (Full Knighthood) Degree focuses on Fraternity.
- The Fourth (Patriotic) Degree focuses on Patriotism.

Typically, the first three degrees are exemplified during a 30 min ceremony conducted by local Knight's or it can be done online. The exemplification focuses on the history and principles of our Order. It presents a full and rich understanding of who we are, what we stand for and what we are called to be. It hearkens back to the simple ceremonies of Unity and Charity first approved by Father McGivney. The ceremony can be held in a council chamber or in the parish with families and friends seated in the pews. They will see first hand, the organization that their husbands, fathers, brothers, sons and friends are joining—the principles and values they are committing to and why it matters.

Shining Amor Award

To qualify for the “Shining Armor Award” new Knights must during their first year of membership:

- **Be involved in at least three council service programs**
- **Attend at least three council business meetings**
- **Receive their Second and Third degrees**
- **Meet with their council’s insurance representative**
- **Recruit at least one new member**
